**LIMERICK CATTLE MARKET**

**WEEKLY MARKET, SATURDAY, OCTOBER 16th.**

Dairy cows and heifers:—The entry, which numbered 53 head, was the highest of the autumn season. The quality of both heifers and cows was well above the average; it was easily the best selection which purchasers had to choose from this season so far. Buyers were again in very good attendance, including shipping interests. Bidding for all classes was keen, the best lots selling particularly well; only a few lots remained unsold. Top price for calved cows went to Mr. Thomas Holmes, Abington, Murroe, at 46½ gns. (her calf having been sold earlier at £7 10s.). Top price for heifers went to Messrs. D. Cusack, Limerick, and Michael McCarthy, Pallasgreen, at 40 gns. each. In-calf and calved cows, best, £41 5s. to £46 10s.; seconds, £37 10s. to £40; others, £30 to £37; small, £24 10s. to £27; in-calf and calved heifers, best, £38 10s. to £40; seconds, £34 to £37 10s.; others, £26 10s. to £32.

Store cattle:—The entry, which again included a very big proportion of strong cattle, was one of the heaviest of the autumn season. Buyers attended strongly, and with bidding better than at recent markets, trade was again good, the value barometer showing a further slight rise. Strong, well conditioned cattle were keenly bid for, and practically all of this description changed hands; the younger cattle also met a good trade and most of this description changed hands. Weanlings were in good demand and the limited number of this description all cleared, the turnover and clearance at this market being the best for some time. (Two and a half year old bullocks and heifers, best, £32 to £34; seconds, £30 to £31 10s.; one and a half year old bullocks and heifers, best, £26 10s. to £29; seconds, £21 5s. to £25; others, £20 10s. to £24 5s.; small, £17 to £19 5s.; weanlings, best, £12 to £14 4s.; seconds, £10 to £10 16s.—Louis de Courcy, Auctioneer.

**LIMERICK CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.**

Wednesday, October 20th—Cattle—The entry of cattle showed a very substantial increase, being the heaviest for some considerable time, all accommodation being completely filled; a particularly good class, with more fat and forward cattle, and many useful drafts of nice quality stores; strong and representative attendance of buyers, with home and shipping interests being fully represented. Beef in steady demand, especially handy weighted prime heifers, which were firm at top current rates; heifer cows also steadily placed at top values; satisfactory trade in cow beef section. Exceptionally large entry of cows suitable for canning, which met a rather quiet sale at easier rates; prime fat cattle wanted and sold well. Major E. S. O'Brien, Cratloe Woods, topped the market with 3 bullocks, which sold at £51 10s, £51, and £50, the purchaser being Mr. Patrick Bugler, St. Senin's, Plassy, Limerick. Aged cattle and forward stores in brisk demand; well-bred feeding bullocks with quality easily negotiated at slightly increased rates; choice drafts of young stores wanted and sold well at late rates, and promising young stores were readily bid for; the right stamp of feeding bullocks and choice coloury dairy heifers met strong competition, recent rates easily obtainable. Small entry of calves, trade for which was steady. The market wound up with a strong and satisfactory finish, a very substantial volume of business transacted and clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £42 10s. to £51 10s.; second run, £37 10s. to £41; small, £28 10s. to £32. Fat cows, best, £37 to £42; second run, £31 10s. to £36; others, £26 to £30; old, £19 to £25. 2½ year old bullocks and heifers, best, £33 to £37; second run, £26 15s to £31. 1½ year old bullocks and heifers, £22 15s. to £27; second run, £15 10s. to £21 10s.; calves, small, £7 5s. to £10 15s.

Sheep—Full seasonable entry, slight increase on last week; a fairly useful turn-out of mutton; not many pens of really prime sheep. Trade opened quiet, with slightly weaker tendency; rates ruled on somewhat lower basis; victuallers purchasing with caution; pens of prime mutton in steady demand at late rates; best hoggets inquired for; sheep short of condition and stores met a slow trade, easier rates; fresh ewes in moderate demand. Small supply of lambs, both fat and stores; brisk trade for choice fat lambs; store lambs inquired for and realised full current rates. All round business in this section not quite as brisk as last Wednesday; buyers operating very cautiously, except for prime sheep; however, a very good clearance was effected. Fat middle weight, 154/- to 161/-; second run, 140/- to 150/-; hoggets, best, 162/6 to 177/-; second run, 152/6 to 160/-; small, 140/- to 147/6; ewes, best, 150/- to 160/-; second run, 110/- to 142/6; lambs, best, 110/- to 152/-; second run, 89/- to

**MR. MICHAEL STRITCH, CLONLARA.**

With very sincere regret we chronicle the demise of Mr. Michael Stritch, licensed vintner, Clonlara, which took place on Wednesday, 13th inst. The deceased, who was in middle life, was extremely popular, and his untimely death came as a profound shock to hosts of friends over a very wide area.

A member of an old and honoured stock, the late Mr. Stritch was a man of the highest character and integrity. A good and kindly neighbour, his services were always at the disposal of those in need, and it can be said with all truth that, a more unselfish personality was not to be found anywhere. Though he never courted popularity—his retiring disposition would not permit him to do so—he was held in the highest regard, esteem, and, indeed, affection by the whole countryside.

To his aged mother and the other members of the family we tender our deepest sympathy on their bereavement.

At the removal of the remains to the Parish Church, there were many manifestations of regret and sorrow. There was a huge concourse of mourners, many having come long distances to attend the obsequies.

After Requiem High Mass on 15th inst., the funeral took place to the ancient cemetery of Thoumpal (Gilloge), the family burial place. The cortege was one of the largest seen in the district for many years.

**MR. P. WALLACE, BALLY-ENGLAND.**
