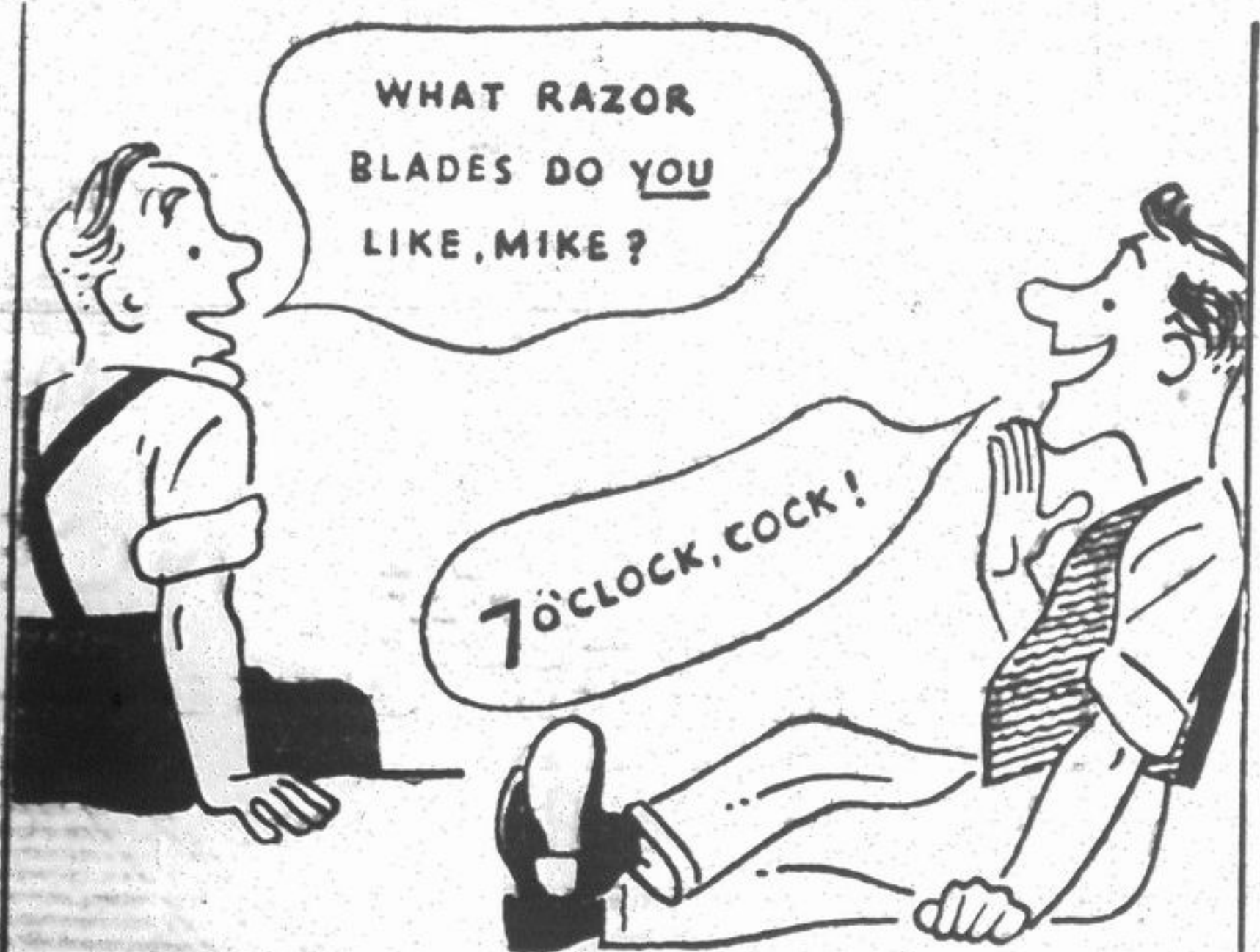
STOPPING THAT COLD!

One of the best ways of nipping a cold in the bud is to take a mustard bath. And, if the cold is already established, a mustard bath, followed by an immediate dose of bed, blankets, and hot water bottles, with, perhaps, a couple of aspirins, will help to a speedy recovery.

To make a mustard bath, well mix about three tablespoonfuls of mustard to a smooth paste with cold water, and stir into the hot bath water. A mustard bath is good for the "snuffly" feeling which one fears may develop into a cold, and a tablespoonful of mustard mixed to a smooth paste with cold water, as before, is sufficient for a foot bath. The feet should be soaked for about 15 minutes.

MIXING CURRY POWDER.

Use a metal spoon when mixing curry powder. If you use a wooden spoon, you will find that it will retain the flavour of the curry and, in addition, it will become stained.



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
