U.S. CONSULATE IN LIMERICK

The Mayor (Mr. M. B. O'Malley, solr.), at the meeting of the City Council on Monday night, referred to the decision of the United States Government to close down the consulate in Limerick. On Saturday he sent a cablegram to Washington in somewhat similar terms to the cablegram sent by the President of the Chamber of Commerce urging that the consulate be retained. He would follow up his cablegram by representations to their own Government and by letters to Washington. He hoped that their efforts would have the desired effect.
