LIMERICK CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, November 3rd—Cattle—Slight decrease in supply; usual attendance of buyers; less beef on offer; prime handy weighted heifers and bullocks scarce and wanted; heifer cows in fair request at late rates, but secondary and older sorts met a dull trade, and difficult to clear unless at reduced values; prime fat cattle wanted, half finished stock met a somewhat lower market; clearance not affected in this section. The store cattle, which are now being sold in the second ring at 1 o'clock, included a number of drafts of useful well-bred, thick feeders, which met steady sale at full recent rates; better trade for bullocks than heifers; lots showing quality and condition changed hands readily; nice dairy heifers also found favour. Useful commercial cattle met a steady trade; secondary and thin store cattle dull and difficult to cash. A very satisfactory clearance in this section. Fat heifers, small, 26 10s. to 32 10s. Cows, best, 36 to 40; second run, 30 to 33 15s.; others, 16 10s. to 25. 2½ year old bullocks, 30 to 38 10s. 1½ year old bullocks and heifers, best, 26 5s. to 33 5s.; second run, 16 to 24 10s. Calves, best, 16 15s. Small, 8 to 10.

Sheep—Numbers about the same, useful show of mutton; average attendance of buyers. Trade opened very quiet, victuallers taking matters easily, and in order to effect sales, vendors had to accept less money than last week; prime wethers and wethers were in most favour, but all classes met a slightly
