The death occurred on Wednesday, October 27th, at Limerick Co. Infirmary, of Mr. Patrick Mitchell, Mitchelstowndown, Knocklong. Deceased gentleman was only ill for a short duration, and his rather sudden demise was a great shock to his brothers, sisters and many relatives. The remains were brought to Knocklong Parish Church on Thursday evening, and after Office and High Mass on Friday morning the interment took place at Emly Cemetery, the burial place of the Mitchells.

**TIR IS TEANGA**

(BY "AN CABACH RUADH.")

**Criunnlu Chinn-bhlana.**

The annual convention of the Gaelic League is being held in St. Ita's Hall, Thomas Street, to-morrow (Saturday, 6th inst.), at 2.30 p.m., and I expect to see a good representative gathering from all parts of the county. For some years past I have been looking forward with hopeful expectancy to new ideas and new methods being proposed or planned, but so far I am disappointed. It is, to my mind, high time that organisations like the Gaelic League changed their methods of improving the state of the Irish language. New approaches are necessary and imperative if the language is to survive.

**Feiseanna.**

Can it be said that Feiseanna are of such great value nowadays as they were in 1903 or so? To what extent can whatever amount of success that has been achieved in the language revival be attributed to Feiseanna? At any particular Feis we have a few schools entering their best pupils, leaving the less intelligent at home and having very little competition with the hundreds of schools in the county not entered at all. Are competitions beneficial even to the schools that enter?

These are some of the questions which have been running through my mind for one or two years and I, personally, have come to the conclusion that Feiseanna are not beneficial to the language. Every other method of approach should be examined and, if necessary, all of them should be scrapped if too antiquated and new ones developed.
