TRAGIC DISCOVERY AT LIMERICK

A tragic discovery was made at the pond near Lansdowne Factory on Friday evening last when the body of Edmund Barry (81), a former clerk of St. Munchin's Parish Church, was found drowned there.

The deceased had been living with a relative at Ballysteen, Co. Limerick, and paid a visit to the city in mid-week. It appeared that his sight had become defective, and he wandered near the water with the result that he slipped in.

An inquest concerning the circumstances of his death was held in Barrington's Hospital this afternoon by the Deputy City Coroner, Mr. J. S. McNeice, Solr

A verdict that death was due to asphyxia caused by accidental drowning was returned.

INSPECTION OF COASTAL DEFENCES

DIPLOMA COURSE FOR WORKERS

The Workers' Diploma Course arranged to be conducted in the Limerick Technical Institute will begin at 3 p.m. on Wednesday next, November 10th, and the opening lectures will be given by Professor Alfred O'Rahilly, President of University College, Cork, and Professor John Busted, of the same educational establishment.

Rev. Father Athenasius, O.F.M., Limerick Friary, has been nominated by his Lordship the Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. O'Neill, to the post of teacher of sociology in connection with the course.

No fewer than 56 applications were received from persons anxious to do the course. These were submitted to the authorities of U.C.C. who have selected 35 students from the total.

To inaugurate the course, a public meeting will be held in the Assembly Hall of the Municipal Technical Institute to-morrow (Tuesday) night at 8 o'clock. Most Rev. Dr. O'Neill, Bishop of Limerick, will preside. Dr. O'Rahilly, Professor Busted, and others from U.C.C. will attend and address the meeting, together with prominent citizens of Limerick.

The Course is of the utmost importance and it is vital that it be well supported and attended from the very start. The Diploma to be secured at the end of two years study will be of the greatest value to those who secure it.
