## DEATH OF MR. G. C. CROMER

It is with very sincere regret that we chronicle the demise of Mr. George C. Cromer, retired jeweller, O'Connell Street, Limerick, who passed away on Wednesday morning in the Stella Maris Nursing Home.

The late Mr. Cromer, who was in his 85th year, was held in very high esteem and regard by all sections of the citizens. His father Conrad Cromer, came to Limerick from Germany about 150 years ago. In 1816 he opened in the city a jewellery and watchmaking establishment, which, to this day, is still held by members of the family, Mr. Robert Evans and Mr. R. T. Evans, nephew and grand-nephew, respectively, of the deceased.

The late Mr. Cromer, though he never took a prominent part in civic affairs, was deeply interested in the progress and advancement of his native city. He took a great pride in Limerick and was wont to say that it was a grand old city and that its citizens were upright and honourable people.

Charitable to a high degree, he never hesitated, much less refused, to give a generous contribution to any worthy cause. He was a truly Christian gentleman and by his passing, Limerick is bereft of a citizen of outstanding traits and characteristics. There is one surviving brother and sister, both of whom reside in Canada.

The funeral took place on Thursday from Stella Maris Nursing Home to St. John's Church Cemetery, and was very large attended.
