## FATAL INJURIES

### HOW CHILD MET HIS END

An inquest was held in Barrington's Hospital this afternoon concerning the circumstances of the death of Vincent Patrick Allen, 14 Naughton's Place, Henry St., Limerick, who died as a result of injuries sustained when he collided with the rere wheel of a lorry owned by Messrs. Rank (Ireland), Ltd., in Henry Street on Thursday last.

The inquest was held by Mr. J. S. McNeice, solr., Deputy City Coroner, and the proceedings were conducted by Supt. P. Colleran. Mr. N. S. Gaffney, solr., was for the deceased's next of kin, and Mr. J. A. Dodds, solr (Messrs. Fitt and Co.) was for Messrs. Rank's and the driver of the lorry, Michael Lonergan, 6 St. Joseph Terrace.

Dr. Francis Crowe, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, gave evidence that the child died fifteen minutes after admission to the Hospital on Thursday evening last. A post-mortem examination revealed an extensive fracture of the skull, death being due to laceration of the brain. In the opinion of witness, the wheel of the lorry did not go over the deceased, whose injuries could have been sustained by an impact with the lorry and then hitting his head on the roadway.

Patrick Graham, a passenger in the lorry at the time of the accident, gave evidence of seeing the deceased boy running into the back of the trailer which was behind the lorry. The driver stopped the lorry immediately on hearing an impact. The vehicle was travelling at about 10 miles per hour at the time.

(The inquest is proceeding).

### ORDER FOR PAYMENT

"I must say I have not much sympathy with this defendant; a man must pay his debts," said Mr. I. M. Houlihan, solicitor, at Ennis District Court on Friday, when applying for an examination order for the payment of a decree for £180 by Ian F. Morrow, Bushy Park, Ennis, who did not attend or file any statement of means.

Mr. E. Monahan, solicitor, defending, said a statement of means should have been filed, but he defended, in view of the fact that there was an order already against him in the District Court, no further order could be made.

Mr. Houlihan, for the creditor (Alfred J. Sexton, auctioneer, Limerick), said Mr. Monahan's point answered the case so far as the particular order was concerned, but it was not a satisfactory answer to the present proceedings. A man's fortunes may change from day to day and week to week, and since the making of the last order this defendant may have come into a substantial legacy or obtained money by various ways and means.

Justice Gordon Hurley made an order for payment of the £180, with three guineas costs, within a week.
