### PASSES AWAY AT NEW- CASTLE WEST

Newcastle West has lost one of its oldest and most esteemed citizens by the death of Mr. Patrick O'Mahony, ex-Town Clerk and draper, of Bishop Street, who passed away with tragic suddenness early on Saturday, 13th inst. Deceased, who belonged to a well-known and respected family, was formerly Town Clerk, from which position he retired on pension some years ago, after filling the post for over forty years. During his long term of office, it may be mentioned, there was never a surcharge against the Town Commissioners, of which he was Executive Officer, and he was frequently complimented by the Local Government auditors for the accuracy and efficiency of his work. Aged about 77 years, Mr. O'Mahony was in his early days a member of the staff of the Devon Estate and of late years he conducted a very successful drapery business in Bishop Street. He was father of Mr. Patrick O'Mahony (junr.), turf accountant and draper, Bishop St., and of the Misses Josephine and Birdie O'Mahony; and was father-in-law of Mr. Joseph Ambrose, District Court Clerk, Newcastle West, and of Mr. Maurice Nelligan, one of the senior officials of the Custom and Excise Department, Dublin. To these, as well as to the bereaved daughters in New York, sincere sympathy will be extended. All sections of the community were represented in the very large gathering at the funeral from Newcastle West Parish Church to Churchtown Cemetery on Sunday.
