"One Chief Assistant County
Engineer mainly to road work; one
Chief Assistant County Engineer

man to general Office work.

"With this additional staff I
would propose to relieve the pre-
sent Assistant County Engineers of
their housing duties so as to enable
more supervision to be given to the
road work, which it is not possible
to supervise adequately under the
present conditions.

"In making this recommendation
I have borne in mind the competing
demands on the rates of the other
services provided by the County
Council, and the additional staff
outlined above is the minimum
with which I feel able to under-
take the duties of my Department."

The report was adjourned to a
special meeting to be held on
Saturday, 11th of December.

in Limerick—all that is asked is the
restoration of one lamp.
