WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET

Tuesday, November 30th—Full seasonable entry, numerically more than last week, and consisted of a most useful class, including a big percentage of choice dairy cows and heifers; extra strong attendance of buyers. Favourable weather conditions helped as heifers and cows, with feather and colour, looked their best; strong enquiry for high grade cows and heifers, for which there was sharp competition, and bidding for promising cows was ready and brisk all round the Ring at advanced rates. Choice and promising heifers also met a firm demand, and there were sufficient buyers to absorb all lots, which gave indication of being a profitable investment. Business was firm and buoyant to end of day; and market practically sold up.
 Top price for dairy cows went to Mr. Ml. Hourigan, Faha, Kildimo, at £53 10s., the runner-up being Mr. C. Ryan, Cluggin, Oola, at £45 10s. Top price for heifers went to Mr. John O'Callaghan, Castle Erkin, Ballybrood, for a calved heifer at £50. Dairy cows, best, £43 10s. to £53 10s.; second run, £39 10s. to £41; ordinary, £34 to £37. Incalf and calved heifers: best, £39 10s. to £50; second run, £28 10s. to £36 10s.—Wm. B. Fitt and Co., Auctioneers.

WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET

Wednesday, December 1st—Cattle—The entry of cattle showed a substantial increase, and a particularly good class, with more fat and forward cattle, and many useful drafts of nice quality stores. Strong attendance, home and shipping interests being fully represented. Beef met a steady selling trade, especially handy weighted heifers and bullocks, which were in firm demand at top current rates; heifer cows were also in request at best rates. A seasonable entry of cows suitable for canning, which met a steady sale at late rates. Aged cattle and forward stores in brisk demand, and well brought out feeding bullocks with quality easy to negotiate. Nice drafts of young stores met a brisk trade; all round steady rates ruled; choice calves wanted and sold well. Trade throughout the day was sharp and brisk, and wound up with a strong and satisfactory finish. A very good clearance effected.
