West, Foynes and Ballingarry were in places covered with a depth of water that made them impassable for motors. Drivers who took a chance at getting through in some cases got stuck and had to be towed out late.

CASE FUR GENERAL SCHEME.

The flood once again emphasises the necessity of a comprehensive drainage scheme for the basin of the Deel. People competent to judge are of opinion that partial schemes and the cleaning of stretches of the upper reaches of the river and its tributaries, however praiseworthy, make matters worse for landowners lower down. If this be true it makes a strong case for advocating a general scheme when one considers, the large area of fertile land affected.
