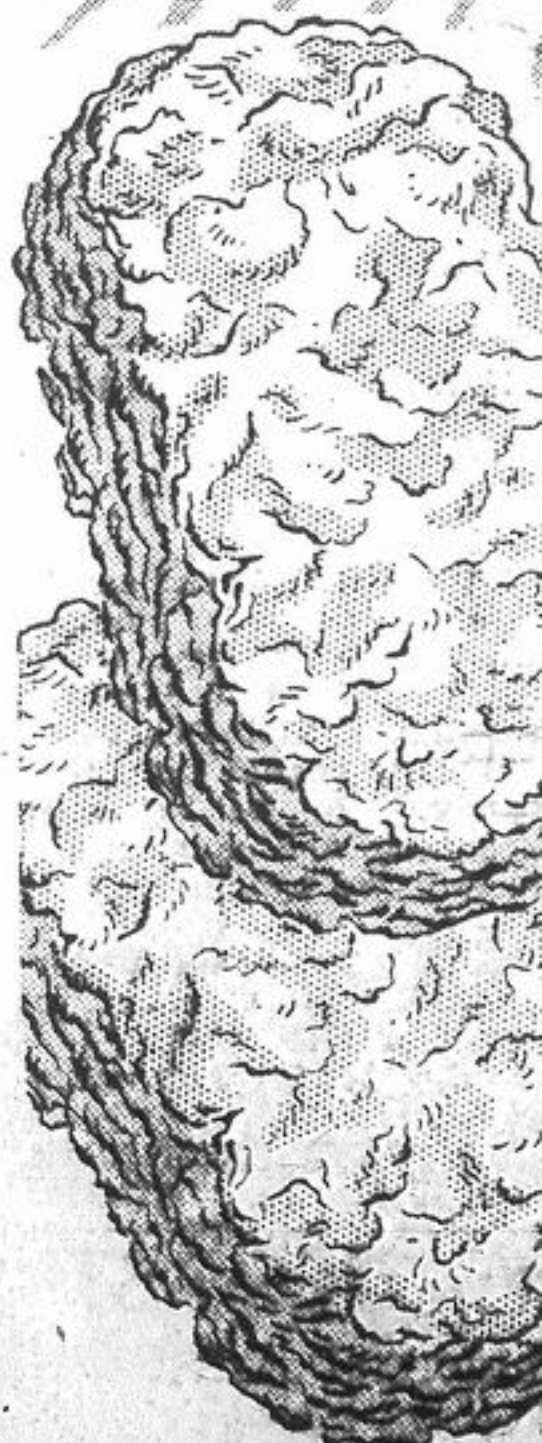
## GLIN FAIR
