DEATH OF MR. J. GLENNY, RATHKEALE

The death of Mr. James Glenny,
Holycross, Rathkeale, which
occurred on Saturday, the 11th inst.,
is deeply regretted by all classes in

An industrious man, straight-
forward and upright at all times,
he was admired and loved,

intimately. Deceased belonged to a
family with a fine patriotic tradition.
One brother, Mr. Johnny Glenny,
who was out with the West
Limerick Flying Column, took an
active part in the recent struggle
for Ireland's freedom, especially
during the perilous days of the
Black and Tan regime.

The remains, followed by an ex-
ceptionally large concourse, were
removed to St. Mary's Church on
Saturday evening, and there was
also a very large funeral when the
interment took place in the local
cemetery on Sunday. The officiating
clergy were Very Rev. Canon
Carroll, P.P.; Rev. T. Costello, C.C.,
and Rev. G. Enright, C.C.
