WEATHER REPORT FOR NOVEMBER

The following are the observations taken at the Crescent during November, 1948:—

Atmospheric Pressure — Highest barometer on the 8th, 30.36; lowest the 4th, 29.65; mean, 30.05 inches.

Temperature-Highest thermometer or warmest day, 62F, on the 13th; London, same day, 63F. Coldest day was the 22nd with 47F., and the coldest night, the 8th at 35F.

Rainfall — Total, 2.15 inches as against 5.33 last year. Number of rainy days or nights, 21, and the greatest 24 hours fall, 0.45 inches on the 14th.

Remarks—November rainfall was below the average, and the month was remarkable for its high humidity and temperatures. The wild, moist conditions throughout the month produced a soft and dull atmosphere. Winds were light and mainly southerly, veering southeast in the last week of the month.
