WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, January 5th—In the cattle section full seasonable entry; a fairly good show of fat and forward cattle, which included a fair proportion of prime heifers; average attendance; prime heifers and bullocks were in steady demand at top current rates, especially medium weighted heifers and heifer cows, but secondary cattle met a quiet trade. Cow beef, which was very plentiful, met a rather dull market; cows suitable for canning again in favour and sold well. In the fat cattle section a fair clearance. Small entry of young stores, trade for which was quiet; this section of the market has not yet settled down since the Christmas holidays. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £37 to £46 10s.; second run, £30 to £36 5s. Fat cows, best, £38 10s. to £42; second run, £26 to £31 10s. Old, £13 10s. to £24 10s. Two year old bullocks and heifers, £21 to £27 10s. Yearlings, £14 to £18.

Sheep—Numbers showed an increase, and a fairly useful turnout of mutton; usual attendance of buyers; steady trade for prime sheep at slightly better rates; well fed wethers easy to sell, and anything with condition had plenty of buyers; secondary and half finished pens met a dull trade; late rates difficult to maintain. All round steady enquiry and sale for well fed sheep. Market well cleared. Fat middle weight, 163/- to 172/6; second run, 150/- to 155/-. Ewes, 125/- to 143/-—Wm. B. Fitt and Co., Auctioneers.
