WAS SENTENCED TO DEATH

The death took place on Wednesday, after a long illness, of Mr. Edward Punch, who was a member of an old Limerick family. The deceased was attached to the Mid-Limerick Brigade of the I.R.A. during the Black and Tan regime. In 1921, along with a fellow volunteer, Mr. Timothy Murphy, he was arrested by British forces, and both were charged with levying war. They were tried by courtmartial and sentenced to death. The report of the trial, which disclosed that the prisoners were savagely beaten and tortured, provoked a heated debate in the House of Commons. The

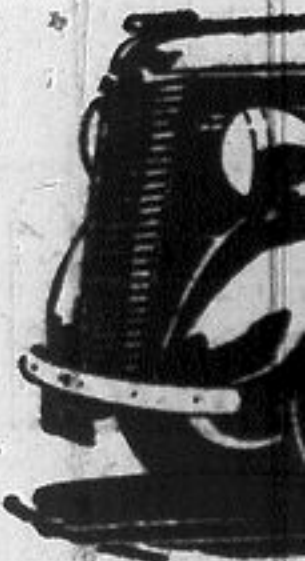
