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Wednesday, after a long illness, of Mr. Edward Punch, who was a member of an old Limerick family. The deceased was attached to the Mid-Limerick Brigade of the I.R.A. during the Black and Tan regime. In 1921, along with a fellow volunteer, Mr. Timothy Murphy, he was arrested by British forces, and both a were charged with levying war. Just when of manhood days; and sentenced to death. The report prisoners were savagely beaten and tortured, provoked a heated debate in the House of Commons. death sentence on both men was later commuted to imprisonment for life. Following the Treaty, the late Mr. Punch took part in the Civil War and was imprisoned for two years. When Mr. de Valera came to power in 1932 Mr. Punch was given employment in the Custom House, Limerick.

The late Mr. Punch, who was unmarried, was a very quiet and unassuming man and his death in the early fifties is deeply regretted. Widespread sympathy is extended to the relatives in their bereavement. THE FUNERAL.
