JUDGE'S DECISION

WHAT NATURAL LAW SAYS

At a meeting of Limerick County Division of the Irish Medical Association held in Limerick, on Friday, 28th instant, the following resolution was unanimously agreed to:—

"We pledge our support to the teaching authorities of U.C., Cork, school of medicine and of the College in their defence of freedom of teaching as against State dictation. The natural law tells us that it is the function of the profession to train its future members, and the State has no authority to teach medicine. In as much as the new hospital in Cork is being financed from voluntary funds (Hospital Sweepstakes) confiscated by the State we are of the opinion that this Hospital should not be vested in the public authority."

KNOCKED MAN DOWN AT NIGHT

John J. Egan, of Ballymorris, Cratloe, was fined £4 with 12/6 expenses at Sixmilebridge District Court on Thursday on a charge of dangerous driving of a pedal bicycle.

Evidence was given that the defendant, who did not appear, when cycling through Sixmilebridge at night knocked a man down. According to a statement, which Supt. Lavan, who prosecuted, said had been made to the Guards, defendant could not give any reason for not seeing the man until he had been within two or three yards of him.

Justice Gordon Hurley allowed one month for payment of the fine.

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
