NATIVE OF LIMERICK SUCCUMBS

Mrs. Mary Fox (83), who was seriously injured in a collision between a car and a 'bus at Balrothery Cross, near Balbriggan, died on Monday night in the Mater Hospital, Dublin. A native of Limerick, she was travelling in the car with her son, Mr. Anthony Fox, Viking Place, Arbour Hill, who was also injured. He was stated, on Monday night, to be much improved.

Two young Belfast men who were also in the car escaped with slight injuries.

The deceased lady who met her death under such tragic circumstances, was, as stated, a native of Limerick. She was sister-in-law of Mr. Robert McConkey, senior, Clare Street (a retired employee of the Limerick Harbour Board) father of Mr. Bob McConkey, the noted Limerick hurler, to both of whom the deepest sympathy of the citizens will be extended.

PROVINCIAL JOURNALISTS

After prolonged discussions, an agreement on wages, hours and conditions affecting provincial journalists has been reached as between the Irish Master Printers' Association and the National Union of Journalists. The negotiations were brought to a successful conclusion last week and the agreement was formally signed on Monday by Mr. J. Flynn, Chairman, I.M.P.A., and Mr. P. Fullerton-Bustard, Organising Secretary, N.U.J. The agreement provides for a minimum weekly wage of £7 payable at the age of 24 years to men having four years service. It also provides for a scale of wages for entrants to the profession and regulates the number of apprentices. The working week has been fixed at 44 hours. Annual holidays of at least two weeks were guaranteed, but in the case of senior men the I.M.P.A. undertook to recommend three weeks' annual leave.

The agreement became operative from the date of signing, 31st January.
