OF GREAT IMPORTANCE. Having heard submissions in law

and on the facts from Messrs. Tynan and Walsh, the Justice said the case was one of great importance to the farming community, because of the extent to which the eleven-months system of grazing lettings was availed of. He had to hold that there was trespass, but he thought the amount claimed was too much. He would, however, give a decree for £4 against Murphy, having held that this defendant, as d the owner and occupier of the land, was liable for payment of any damage done by the trespass of the cattle grazing on his lands.
