HORSE TAKES FRIGHT

As a result of having been thrown from a horse-drawn trap which he was driving home from Knockea Church yesterday morning, Timothy Hayes, a married man of about 60 years of age, Cahernorry, Ballyneety, lies in Barrington's Hospital in a very critical condition.

The accident occurred when the horse took fright as Mr. Hayes was returning from 10 o'clock Mass. There were many people on the road at the time and they were scattered in all directions by the wild pranks of the animal. Mr. Hayes was pitched heavily on to the road and sustained very severe head injuries, while the trap was badly damaged. Before the animal was brought to a standstill it knocked down about six people, while cycles were damaged when he dashed against them. The six people suffered injuries, which were not of a serious nature, though one of the injured included a little girl. It is believed that the trap went over her body, but the extent of her injuries have not been ascertained, as a passing motorist brought her to her home in the district.

When Mr. Lane was picked up it was seen that he was unconscious and was bleeding from the ears.

LORRIES WITHOUT LIGHTS

Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., at Adare Court, took a very serious view of motor lorries being driven at night without lights. Two defendants in this category, who were summoned, were each fined £2, and the Justice issued a warning that offences of that kind in future would be met with £5 fines.

In the first case, Guard Breen proved that Timothy Cronin, Convent Street, Abbeyfeale, drove through Adare at 9.28 p.m. on the 13th January without having the lights "on."

Guard Kleely gave evidence in a case against John Lenihan, Mount Collins, Abbeyfeale, that the defendant was driving at Ardshanbally on the 14th January without lights.

Neither of the defendants appeared.
