POPULAR FIGURE HONOUR IN U.S.A.

DEATH OF MR. W. P. CLIFFORD

With very sincere regret we
chronicle the demise of Mr. Wm. P.
Clifford, Boher, Co. Limerick, which
took place in a Cork Nursing Home
yesterday, after a long illness. The
deceased was one of the best known
men in Munster. For many years,
up to his retirement, he was Chief
Dairy Inspector under the Depart-
ment of Agriculture, and in the dis-
charge of his duties he displayed
energy, initiative and ability of a
high degree. He was better known,
perhaps, as a devotee of our
national pastimes. For twenty years
he was Chairman of the Co. Lime-
rick G.A.A. Board. Subsequently he
was elected Chairman of the Mun-
ster Council and, later still, Chair-
man of the Central Council. In
recognition of his wonderful ser-
vices he was, on his retirement,
made Hon. President for life of both
bodies. He had a thorough know-
ledge of the rules of the G.A.A., and
his decisions on knotty points were
always accepted without challenge.

A gentleman of many excellent
traits, he was held in high esteem
and regard. Outspoken and inde-
pendent, he was admired for his
straightforward disposition, force of
character and lack of self-interest.
Behind what would seem to be a
cold exterior, there was a warmth
of feeling and a depth of human
understanding that could not fail to
establish him in the affections of all
who came in close contact with
him. His passing has removed a
man of sterling qualities, and to his
widow, son and brothers, Mr. T. J.
Clifford, District Court Clerk, and
Mr. Sean Clifford, Superintendent
Home Assistance Officer for the
county, and other relatives, we
tender our heartfelt sympathy.

ruary, has been postponed to the
