### DEATH OF MRS. MARY O'FLANAGAN

The death of Mrs. Mary O'Flanagan, N.T., wife of Mr. P. O'Flanagan, "Earlton," O'Connell Avenue, Limerick, which took place on Tuesday night, has occasioned widespread regret and sorrow.

The deceased lady, who was a daughter of our popular fellow citizen, Mr. P. Walsh, Wickham St., was a most enthusiastic worker in the promotion of Irish cultural activities. In the classroom and out of it she did not spare herself in advancing the language. After school she was to be found working in the Gaelic League Hall on behalf of Coisde na bPaiste, or some other activity connected with the Gaelic movement.

In recognition of her work on behalf of the language she was appointed delegate to Coisde Gnotha of the Gaelic League on many occasions. She also devoted much of her time to the development of the Irish section of Feile Luimnighe.

By her death the Gaelic movement generally has lost a most enthusiastic worker.

In private life the late Mrs. O'Flanagan was a most exemplary wife and mother, and heartfelt sympathy will be tendered to her husband, five young children and other relatives in their bereavement.

The funeral on Thursday from St. Michael's Church to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery was of very large proportions, testifying to the high esteem and regard in which the deceased lady was held.

### NEWCASTLE WEST BRANCH

Mr. Daniel Ahern, B.A., solicitor, chairman, presided at the annual general meeting of the Newcastle West branch of Clann na Poblacht which was held at the Carnagh Hall on Sunday last. There was a representative attendance of delegates, and after a brief discussion it was unanimously decided to affiliate the branch for the coming year. The attendance included James P. O'Kelly (Churchtown Road), vice-chairman, and an apology for non-attendance was received from the treasurer, Mr. V. Barrett. On the suggestion of the Chairman, it was decided to defer the election of officers to a future general meeting of the branch to be held on Sunday, 13th March, when it was hoped that a prominent member of the National Executive would attend and address the delegates.

A number of important matters were discussed at the meeting, including the question of providing employment in the district. In connection a resolution was adopted calling on the Minister for Lands and Government to speed up the start of work on the town housing scheme, in view of the serious lack of accommodation in the town. A further resolution directed attention of the Minister for Health to the urgent need for providing proper public sanitary accommodation in the town; and for extending the existing water and sewerage services to the Knockane and other areas not at present served by these amenities.

On the suggestion of Mr. O'Kelly it was decided to ask the Minister for Lands to avail of the offer made to his department of a parcel of 10 acres at Glenagown for reforestation purposes. The same Minister was requested to give early consideration to the claims of the Castlemahon Feohanagh area in connection with the national drainage scheme proposed to be undertaken during the coming summer.

The branch unanimously adopted a resolution protesting against the arrest and imprisonment of Prince Primate of Hungary, and offering congratulations to the Minister for External Affairs (Mr. McBride) on the stand he had taken on behalf of the Irish people.
