es by him appeared in the "Edinburgh Review" over a period of twenty years. "The North British Review," "The Month," "The Monthly," and "Chamber's Encyclopaedia" also contained contributions from his pen. When "Chamber's Encyclopaedia" began to appear, he wrote to the editor protesting against the false or misleading presentation of Catholic belief and practice in some of its articles. The editor promptly replying asking Dr. Russell to contribute any articles to the remainder of the work in which the teaching of the Catholic Church was involved. Thus, he became the author of a list of articles from "The Month" that widely-known producer of the recital of whose titles fills the closely-printed pages of the "Monthly."

Dr. Russell was succeeded in the presidency of the College by Dr. John MacCarthy, who became Archbishop of Dublin in 1885. He was followed by Dr. John MacCarthy, late Bishop of Cloyne (1884). Next came Dr. Gargan (1893), and after him Dr. John MacCarthy (1903-1912), who as Archbishop of Melbourne continued to bring lustre on his Alma Mater and its native land.
