ATHEA'S LATE P.P. PASSING OF A POPULAR PASTOR

Limerick Diocese has lost a revered and esteemed pastor by the death of the Very Rev. Father T. Connolly, P.P., who passed away on the 7th inst., after an extended illness. Aged 76 years, he belonged to an old and respected farming family in the Grange district of Bruff. His kindly, genial and ready humorous disposition endeared him to his clerical brethren and to his parishioners, who mourn his passing with deserving and respectful regret. During his thirteen years in charge of the parish, always eschewing the limelight, he was honoured and respected for his devotion to the spiritual and temporal affairs of his flock, his generous sense of charity and his kindly forbearance in the administration of his sacred office.
