

DIED IN ENGLAND

WHILE VISITING HIS SISTER

The death of Mr. Michael J. Dwane, P.C., postmaster, Charleville, which took place suddenly at Wallesey, Liverpool, caused a profound shock when the sad news reached the people of Charleville on Saturday (writes our Charleville correspondent). Deceased went to England a fortnight previously to visit his sister, Mrs. M. Shanahan, and her husband, Mr. Thomas Shanahan, both of whom were seriously ill. Mr. Shanahan died a short time after and Mr. Dwane, who was accompanied by his wife, remained over until his sister had sufficiently convalesced to bring her home. His death is a severe blow to his wife and family, and widespread sympathy is extended them in their very sad bereavement. A son of the late Mr. John and Mrs. Dwane, Chapel Street, Charleville, he entered the post office in a clerical capacity at an early age, serving the most of his time in the Charleville office. Eleven years ago he was promoted postmaster in succession to the late Mr. P. J. Scott. He was a most competent official, courteous and obliging, and enjoyed the esteem and confidence of the public at large, while he was always kind and sympathetic in his relations with the staff, both indoor and outdoor, all of whom are deeply grieved at the death of a true friend, who was ever solicitous for their welfare in the service. A most devout Catholic, he was deeply attached to his wife and family, and as an energetic and active worker in the St. Vincent de Paul Society, he took a practical interest in the poor of the town, always helping in his own unostentatious way to alleviate distress and succour the needy when occasion required. He was father of the late Rev. John Dwane, Maynooth College, who died shortly before his ordination, and was cousin of Mr. D. T. Dwane, ex-postmaster of Cavan, and now of Redgate, Limerick.
