Wednesday, April 20th—Cattle—A substantial entry again forwarded, increase in beef section; slight increase in store section; the entry included a number of choice drafts, especially in the beef department. Strong attendance of buyers, both shipping and home interests. Active trade for prime heifers and bullocks, preference being for the latter; top prices freely paid; anything with intentions to condition readily bid at top current prices; heifer calves of the better class came in with appreciable attention and a free price; also fresh young beef cows; secondary cows and those suitable for canning met a quiet demand. Trade active and firm for beef, with complete clearance almost effected. Aged and forward bullocks wanted, and continue to find ready customers. In young store section, choice two year old dairy heifers and polled bullocks met strong demand, all round dearer rates; useful grazing drafts wanted and change easily effected. Nice small cattle in request, and made more money than last week. Yearlings, choice drafts again in brisk demand. Business for store stock was buoyant and firm, with marked competition. Steady selling trade throughout the day. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £48 to £58 10s.; second run, £43 10s. to £46; small, £37 10s. to £37 10s. Fat cows, best, £45 to £53 10s.; second run, £35 to £44. Yearlings, £31 15s. to £33. Two and a half year old bullocks and heifers, £31 to £35 5s.; second run, £22 to £30 5s. Yearlings, best, £20 to £24; second run, £13 to £19.
