**FOUND UNCONSCIOUS  
 DEATH OF CO. LIMERICK  
 FARMER**

Andrew Hickey, a farmer, aged about 70 years, residing at Anhid, Croom, was found unconscious in his own field at Anhid last week by Mr. James Curtin, a neighbour. He was apparently going to milk his cows when he had a seizure.

The Gardai were notified and Sergeant Duffy, G.S., Croom, had Mr. Hickey removed to Croom Hospital, where he died the following day.

Dr. Burke examined the deceased and found that death was due to natural causes and the Coroner for East Limerick did not, in the circumstances, deem an inquest necessary.

The late Mr. Hickey was a very popular farmer in the district and his demise occasioned deep regret over a wide area.

His remains were removed to Croom Church and the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery in the presence of a large congregation.

Officiating Clergy were: Very Rev. E. Condon, P.P., Banogue; Rev. D. Crowley, C.C., Croom.

Mr. Andrew Hickey, cousin, was the chief mourner.
