Replying to Supt. Colleran, who prosecuted, Sergeant Farren, John Street, made application for a remand in custody. He arrested the accused on the 31st May and gave him the usual legal caution. In reply to the charge, the accused said he had nothing to say. Witness was making further enquiries and was asking for a further remand for one week.

Mr. N. S. Gaffney, solicitor for the accused, asked if there was any question of bail.

DEATH OF ENGLISH ARCHBISHOP

The death occurred to-day of Most Rev. Dr. Moriarty, Archbishop of Shrewsbury.

Dr. Moriarty was one of the prime movers in the publication of a document written on the instruction of Cardinal Mindszenty before his arrest, in which details were given of the "confession drug" used by the Communists. Archbishop Moriarty, who was invalided at the time last January, ordered the reading in all the churches in his Diocese of extracts from the document.

WAS FIRST G.A.A SECRETARY IN CLARE

Mr. Cornelius Kearney, of Carrahan, Co. Clare, whose death has been announced, was the first honorary secretary of the G.A.A. in Clare (writes our Ennis correspondent). He was an uncle of Mr. M. J. Kinnane, L.L.B., Commissioner of the Garda Siochana. On the day of his funeral the flag on the Old Ground Hotel, Ennis, flew at half mast by orders of Mr. James O'Regan, proprietor, who had been a personal friend of deceased and prominently identified with G.A.A. activities during the Association's early days in Clare.

GARDA PAY INCREASES

General MacEoin stated in the Dail yesterday that a new pay order was being prepared to provide for the increases in the remuneration of the Gardai Siochana which were recently approved by the Government. The increases would range from a minimum of 11/- per week to £65 per annum in the case of a first grade Superintendent.
