As this privilege has been grossly abused, the Pope has decreed a special "sanctuary" which is walled up except in certain times of grace. During the Holy Year all pilgrims, after entering the Basilica, come to the Holy Door, kneeling at the threshold as they do so.

MONSTRANCE WEIGHING A TON
