DEATH OF MR. M. H. CASHIN

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Michael H. Cashin, journalist, which took place yesterday at his residence, 16 Crescent Avenue, Limerick, after a long illness.

The late Mr. Cashin, who was in his 71st year, retired from active journalism in 1936 owing to ill-health. He began his journalistic career on the "Munster News," later joining the staff of the "Limerick Chronicle." A journalist of rare gifts, his writings were marked by originality and a turn of phrase denoting culture and scholarly attainments. About 20 years ago he became Editor of the "Chronicle," but, as already stated, he was forced by failing health to live a secluded life for some years past.

In his younger days he attended in his professional capacity many stormy political meetings and his anecdotes of events behind-the-scenes would provide material for a very readable book. A good impromptu speaker, the deceased had command of an extensive vocabulary and his comments and observations always commanded both respect and attention.

In private life he was held in very high esteem and regard, and deep sympathy is extended to his brothers, sisters, nephews, nieces and other relatives in their bereavement. Two of his nephews are highly honoured members of the journalistic profession, Mr. P. J. Fitzgibbon, playwright and present Editor of the "Limerick Chronicle" and Mr. E. D. Fitzgibbon, sports staff, "Irish Independent."

The remains will be removed to St. Michael's Church at 7 o'clock this evening and the funeral will take place to-morrow to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery following the celebration of Requiem Mass at 10.30 o'clock.

THE DECISION.

The Judge, in giving his decision, said he was satisfied that the applicant did meet with the accident, and he would take the view that he was totally incapacitated to the 31st December and would make an award of 37/6 per week as from the date of the accident up to 31st December, 1948.

He held that the applicant was partially incapacitated as from 1st January to the 5th April, but as there was no evidence of post accident earnings he could not make any award.

THREE TO BE DELETED

At the monthly meeting of the Ennis Urban Council on Friday night objection was taken by Mr. O. Linnane to a questionnaire which the Council asks applicants for urban houses to fill up. He said some of the questions were too personal and some were stupid. For instance one was: "Total income from all sources." Another was: "Weekly income of applicant," followed by the stupid query—"Rent applicant would be prepared to pay for an urban dwelling." Every applicant, of course, would reply that he was prepared to pay the rent demanded. There was no need for such queries in view of the fact that two solvent sureties had to be provided to guarantee payment of the rent.

The Council decided to delete the three questions referred to from any questionnaires sent out in future.
