**"A RISKY ACTION."**

"In my opinion," added Mr. Fitzgerald, "this would have been a very risky action from the point of view of proving negligence and I advised Mr. Sheehy to accept the settlement on my client's behalf. The special damages amount to £14 14s. in doctor's and hospital fees. I am applying to your lordship for an order that these sums be paid out of the £90 and that the balance be invested in suitable bonds for the benefit of the child."

The Judge made the order sought for by Mr. Fitzgerald.

Mr. D. G. O'Donovan, solicitor, appeared for the defendant and consented to the making of the order.

**DEATH OF MISS MADGE CORBETT**

The remains were removed from St. John's Hospital yesterday evening to St. Michael's Church, and the funeral took place to-day, after Requiem Mass, to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. The cortege on both occasions was very large and representative.
