have been getting a fairly good price for our milk. One creamery I know has paid as high as 1/41 a gallon for milk and, for the present, at any rate, I think we should leave things as they are. Mr. Canty - Anyway, there is no

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shortage of butter in the country, as far as I am aware. Mr. Dore-I don't agree with you

there, Mr. Canty. There are a lot of people who cannot get enough butter under the rationing system. Mr. O'Connell thought the con-

sumers should be allowed a bigger ration of butter than they were at present getting. The creameries had the butter and they should be allowed to sell it.

## COMPLICATED QUESTION.

The Chairman suggested that the resolution should be adjourned for the present in view of the complications that might arise in regard to the payment of the subsidy on milk if butter rationing was abolished. He believed the question was a much more complicated one than most people were in a position to appreciate.

Mr. Quish, at this stage, intimated that in deference to the wishes of the Chairman and other members he would withdraw his resolution for the present.

The discussion then ended.

# HORNS OF IRISH ELK

When cutting turf in Drewsboro' bog, Scariff, last week (writes our Killaloe correspondent), Michael Murphy, of Tuamgraney, unearthed a massive pair of horns. Speculation was rife amongst the bog workers as to what species of animal the horns belonged, but when brought to the village they were identified by Mr. C. D. Sparling, of Brooklawn, as those of an Irish elk. The only other find of its kind recorded in East Clare was about 90 years ago, when the head and horns of an elk were found in Kilgorey Lake, adjoining the residence of the O'Connells. The head and horns are still in the possession nat of the Sampson family, Moynoe, Scariff.
