DREW BENEFIT WHILE WORKING

SUSPENSORY SENTENCE

Before Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., at Charleville Court,

James Murphy, Cooleens, Charle- ville, was summoned for having by false statements or representations to the National Health Insurance Society unlawfully obtained £7 11s. 3d. sickness benefit during the period 23rd November, 1946, to the 27th September, 1947, in respect of 27 days during which he had been employed by Messrs. P. and J. Ryan, Ltd., and the Cork County Council.

Supt. P. Kelly, G.S., Mallow, pro- secuted; and Mr. D. Fleming, soli- citor, defended.

Patrick Maguire, an Inspector of the National Health Insurance Society, said that during the period the defendant worked he drew £7 11s. 3d. from the State.

Mr. Fleming said that it was really through poverty that he took this money and he was now pre- pared to re-imburse the Society if he got time. He was at present working with a farmer near the town.
