**DIED ON WAY TO MASS THE LATE "DICK" SLATTERY**

Mr. Richard Slattery, of Ballinvreena, Kilfinane, collapsed and died on his way to Knocklong to attend Mass on Wednesday, June 29th (writes our Ballylanders correspondent). The remains were taken to his home, and the following Thursday evening were removed to St. Joseph's Parish Church, Knocklong. After Office and High Mass on Friday, 1st inst., the interment took place at Emlly Cemetery, and a huge cortege of friends and relatives attended the burial. The late "Dick" Slattery was of middle age and was very popular in the locality. He was nephew of Dr. Slattery and brother of Very Rev. Father Tom Slattery, Martin, Shirlough, Hull. He was a brother to the Slattery family, of Ballinvreena, who were very prominent during Ireland's fight for independence, and one of the family, Lieut. Willie Slattery, was cruelly shot to death by British Crown Forces. The deceased was a Staff Officer of the Galtee Brigade, Local Defence Force, and was most efficient in his duties. Deep sympathy is extended to the bereaved family.
