## NOISE AFTER DANCES

### PATRONS MUST CONDUCT THEMSELVES

Complaint was made by the Garda at Rathkeale Court on Monday, before Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., of the conduct of some of the patrons after they had left the local dance hall in the small hours of the morning after "Cinderella" dances. The complaints arose out of an application by the owner of the hall for a number of occasional dance licenses until 1 o'clock in the morning.

Supt. J. J. Cooney, Adare, suggested that the licenses should be only granted until 12 midnight, as the local Gardai considered that hour was late enough.

Sergt. Kirk told the Justice that a good deal of annoyance was being caused by patrons singing and shouting in the streets after they left the dance hall at 1 a.m. He suggested that the dances should be only allowed until midnight in order to give the Guards an opportunity of checking this conduct.

The Justice said he would grant the licences until 1 a.m. on this occasion, but if there were any further complaints he would have to consider refusing to grant licences in future. He saw no reason in the world why people, after enjoying a couple of hours dancing, could not go home quietly, instead of singing and shouting in the streets and disturbing householders who wanted a night's rest.

Mr. M. F. Noonan (Messrs. Liston and Co., solrs.), who appeared for the dance hall owner, said he would ask his client to refuse admission to patrons who were guilty of the conduct complained of.

Justice—Of course, I appreciate the fact that dance hall owners are not to blame for the conduct of their patrons after they leave the hall, but if these people don't stop this conduct after leaving the hall I will have to stop the dances.

## DEATH OF RETIRED TEACHER

### MR. W. MURPHY, ASKEATON

The death occurred on Friday, July 8th, at his residence, Main Street, Askeaton, of Mr. William Murphy, retired national teacher (writes our Askeaton correspondent). The deceased had been confined to the house for some time prior to his death. He was uncle of the Rev. Fr. Joseph Halpin, C.S.Sp., Onitia, Owerri, and also uncle of the Rev. Fr. Jerh. Murphy, at present in New Jersey, and of the late Dr. William Murphy, Wales. He was aged 84.

As principal of the Cappagh National School, the late Mr. Murphy endeared himself to his many pupils, and at the same time earned the name of being a great teacher. Many of his ex-pupils are now holding responsible positions. After his retirement about 14 years ago he was Professor of Science at Rockwell College, Cashel, where again his quiet charm and understanding made him a real favourite.

The remains were removed to the Parish Church on Friday evening, and the funeral took place to the Abbey at 1 o'clock on Saturday. On both occasions the attendance was large and represented all sections of the community. The officiating clergy were: Rev. Fr. O'Donnell, P.P. (Askeaton); Rev. Fr. O'Dea, C.C. (Askeaton); Rev. Fr.
