MILK STANDARD

PROBATION ACT APPLIED

Before Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L.,
at Charleville Court on Tuesday,
Garda M. Corcoran, Food and
Drugs Inspector, Charleville, sum-
moned William Reidy, Ballynagoul,
Charleville, under the Food and
Drugs Act, for selling milk which
was not of the nature, substance
and quality demanded by the pur-
