DEEPLY REGRETTED

DEATH OF HIGHLY POPULAR CITIZEN

Deep and widespread regret was

caused by the announcement of the death in St. John's Hospital, Limerick, on Friday of Mr. Thomas A. Spencer, Rosbrien. The deceased, although ailing somewhat for a considerable time, became seriously ill only some days ago, and his demise, therefore, came as a particular shock not only to his immediate relatives but to a host of friends who deservedly held him in the highest regard. The late Mr. Spencer, who came of highly respected stock, was brother of Rev. Joseph Spencer, C.SS.R., Chapham, London; of Mr. John Spencer, City Technical Institute Teaching Staff; Mr. Gerard Spencer, M.A.; Mrs. Tom Condon and Mrs. James, Rosbrien. Highly cultured and talented, and possessing great charms of manner and fine social qualities, he enjoyed esteem, respect and popularity among all sections of the community. A member of the Redemptorist Choir since a boy, he had a most pleasing tenor voice and was for many years one of the most prominent and appreciated members of the Old Limerick Operatic Society. A good singer and excellent actor, he very creditably filled many leading roles in his time in the Gilbert and Sullivan operas. Indeed, he always played a useful part in everything concerning the musical and dramatic life of his native city. For many years up to the time of his death, he was also a member of the Limerick Catholic Institute and of the Shannon Rowing Club, being a great favourite with the members of these bodies. Of splendid principles of honour, uprightness and integrity, he was in all respects a very loveable character and few had ever so many sincere friends and well-wishers or deserved their appreciation so fully. To the members of the bereaved family and their relatives we extend our very sincere sympathy on their sorrow.

The remains of the deceased were removed to St. Michael's Church on Saturday evening and the funeral took place yesterday to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. On both occasions the attendances of mourners and the general public were very large and representative, testifying in an eloquent degree to the popularity enjoyed by the late Mr. Spencer, the widespread regret caused by his death and the deep sympathy felt for his highly respected relatives.
