DEATH OF MR. M. FINN, MILLMOUNT

The death took place recently of
 Maurice Finn, Millmount, Kilmall-
 ock. The deceased was a very
 popular and well-liked figure, and

 gret. For many years he had been
 foreman of Bruere Co-operative
 Bakery, which position he occupied
 up to the beginning of his fatal ill-

 and his family played a prominent
 part in the War of Independence.

 It may be possible to suppress
 this want now and thus avoid
 trespass of animals into
 the field from outside and the
 danger of horses from it
 night around neighbouring
 avenues and thoroughfares
 seriously endangering traffic
 and causing much annoyance
 otherwise.
