## DIED IN AMERICA WAR OF INDEPENDENCE RECALLED

The recent death in the United States of Commandant Owen O'Keeffe, formerly of Knockroe, Kiltelly, recalls to memory the many stirring events that took place in Limerick during the Black and Tan campaign (writes a correspondent). A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. O'Keeffe, Owen, from an early age, showed a remarkable devotion to the cause of freedom, and was one of the first Kiltelly men, including Col. Liam Hayes, to join the "East Limerick Flying Column" at its inception. In practically every engagement between the opposing forces in his area of operations he played a major part and was particularly prominent at the famous "Dromkeen Ambush" and also at Grange. He was much wanted by Crown forces, and had many thrilling escapes from death and capture. It was no wonder, then, that every day of his life during those hectic years was filled with dramatic incidents.
