He urged that there should be a good Agricultural Institute of Research and Education, and instead of having 70 County Instructors, there should be—as Mr. Dillon, Minister for Agriculture, had advocated—one instructor to every three parishes, to build up agriculture in Ireland; and although he (Mr. Carrigan) did not always agree with Mr. Dillon on details he was forging ahead.

WHERE WE LAG BEHIND.

Ireland was lagging behind most other European nations in the scientific development of agriculture, and if she wanted to retain the United Kingdom market she would have to become as good a producer as the many other nations who were competing for this market.

Commenting on the land reclamation and drainage programmes now in operation, Mr. Carrigan said he hoped that Ireland would try her best to get the maximum out of these programmes, for it would mean a higher standard of living.

Pointing out that the placing of more and more responsibility on Governments meant the giving up

the national economy. It did not matter how many facilities were provided by the traders if they did not have the purchasers, and the biggest purchaser always had been—and always would be—the farming community. The present economic system was complicated, because trading had become too complicated for the ordinary person. It could be said to have been made anti-Christian. They must base their economic fundamentals on Christian principles, and in this regard Muintir na Tire could play a foremost part. The Council of Europe could, he said, do a tremendous amount in relation to human rights, but only if its policy be based on fundamental Christian principles.
