WORDY SUMMONS

BREACH OF TRAFFIC LIGHT REGULATIONS

Summonses issued against persons disobeying traffic lights are wordy documents. One of them before Justice Kenny at the Limerick District Court to day read:—"Whereas a complaint has been made that on July 27, at the road junction of William St.-Sarsfield St., at a time when the control of traffic at said road junction was effected by means of mechanical signals consisting of lights automatically flashing and occulting in fixed cycles, you, the said defendant, while driving a vehicle within the scope of such control, did fail to comply with the said signals . . . etc."

The defendant was Michael Keyes, Silvermines, Co. Tipperary, who did not appear.

Sergt. Morgan briefly told the Justice that he saw Keyes driving a car across the junction while the red light was against him.

And the Justice, as briefly, imposed a fine of 10/- on Keyes.
