Joseph Cregan, of Skagh, Croom, the County Limerick hurler, was again formally charged at to-day's sitting of the Limerick District Court with causing grievous bodily harm to Michael Herbert by striking him on the head with a hurley on Sunday week last at the Limerick Gaelic Grounds.

Supt. P. Colleran, who prosecuted, said he wanted a further remand of Cregan for a fortnight, and Inspector Griffin made a deposition in which he formally asked for the remand.

Mr. J. S. McNeice, solicitor, who in the absence of Mr. T. E. O'Donnell, solicitor, appeared for Cregan, did not object to the adjournment application.

Justice C. S. Kenny, acting for Justice Gleeson, granted the fortnight's adjournment as sought.

Cregan is on bail.

DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN RACING FIGURE

The death took place recently in Leix of Mr. John Byrnes at a comparatively early age. He was a native of Knockainey, Co. Limerick, and up to a few years ago, when he took up residence in Leix, was all his life associated with the Knockainey Stud, which bred such famous horses as Ardpatrik and Galtee Mor, past English Derby winners.

The Byrnes family were long associated with Knockainey Stud and the passing of this popular racing figure is deeply regretted in the district and surrounding country. There was a large attendance at the Interment, which took place at Knockainey.
