claimed to immunise all hoofed animals against the destructive foot-and-mouth disease, have started at Giessen, in the U.S. zone of Germany. Developed by a scientist at Darmstadt, the serum, described as "silver compound" has the backing of both the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the German Bizonal Administration.

Soon, cattle injected with doses of the serum varying in strength, will be placed in infected stables to determine the most effective compound. If the experiments are successful, the serum could be produced at such a cheap rate that farmers could immunise their stocks as a preventive measure.
