**OBSEQUIES AT ABBEYFEALE**

**T**HE obsequies of Sister Mary Alphonsus Connolly, which took place on Monday, in the Convent of Mercy Chapel, Abbeyfeale, were attended by a very large and representative attendance of clergy and public. Sister Alphonsus, a native of Meanus, Bruff, and a member of a well known family, was a highly respected and much esteemed member of the Abbeyfeale Sisters of Mercy, who were responsible for such excellent educational services in West Limerick. She had devoted 56 years of her religious life between Ballingarry and Abbeyfeale Convents.

**MEN WHO DIED FOR THE REPUBLIC**

(To the Editor, "Limerick Leader.")

**A**CHARA—According to Press reports it is proposed, in a scheme of alterations being carried out at Leinster House, to give new and more prominent positions to the memorial portraits of the pro-Treaty deputies—Arthur Griffith, Michael Collins and Kevin O'Higgins.

In view of this may I be permitted to use the columns of your paper to draw public attention to the fact that Leinster House contains no memorial to the 1916 leaders or to the following heroic Dail deputies who gave their lives in defence of the Irish Republic, which all parties now acclaim: Terence MacSwiney, T.D. (died on hunger strike, Brixton Gaol, London); Cathal Brugha, T.D. (killed in action, O'Connell St., Dublin, 7th July, 1922); Seamus Devins, T.D. (killed in action, Ben Bulbin, Sligo, August, 1922); Harry Boland, T.D. (killed at Skerries, 1st August, 1922); Liam Mellows, T.D. (executed, Mountjoy Gaol, 8th December, 1922); Erskine Childers, T.D. (executed, Beggar's Bush Barracks, 24th November, 1922).

Surely now that the Irish Republic has been accepted by all parties the time is opportune to honour these men.

The majority of the present Dail took a strong stand against the imposed Treaty of 1921 and it would be a national scandal if the Dail which enacted the Republic of Ireland Act were to dissolve without according due honour within the precincts of our Parliament Buildings to the martyred deputies I have mentioned.

Fianna Fail and Clann na Poblachta have a solemn obligation in this matter, as have also such deputies as Ben Maguire, John Flynn, Roddy Connolly, P. Finucane, D. Spring, M. Donnellan, James Larkin and Thomas Burke—Mise, le meas,
