Wednesday, September 7.—Cattle—Larger entry than last week; buyers in full attendance; in beef section big increase, and included a number of choice bullocks and heifers. Trade active, and demand firm for this class, at to current rates. Nicely meated cow heifers sold well, secondary and older sorts also found favour; almost a complete clearance effected. In store section, increased entry; trade showed a healthy tone, and for choice drafts of feeding bullocks and coloury dairy heifers, sales were easily negotiated; and useful commercial cattle were freely bid for. All round demand active, with an early and quick clearance.
