DEATH OF MR. P. B. CAHILL MINOR AND JUNIOR GAMES

It is with very deep regret we announce the death of Mr. Patrick B. Cahill, Callow House, Askeaton, who died on the 6th inst. A most popular and extensive farmer, deceased was well known in racing and hunting circles. One of the founders of Rathkeale Race Company, and up to the time of his death its Chairman, he was also a director of Limerick Race Co. His interest in racing dated back to the beginning of the century and he never spared efforts to keep the popular Rathkeale venue a noteworthy success.

He was a brother of the late Rev. E. Cahill, S.J., Miltown Park, who will be remembered for his brilliant works on "Freemasonry and Anti-Christian Movement" and others, and of the late John Cahill, Secretary and Manager of Limerick Race Co.

A kind and ever courteous gentleman, the late Mr. Cahill was a loving father and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew and came in contact with him. His funeral to Rathkeale Cemetery was one of the largest seen through the town for years and his passing leaves a gap not easily filled.
