PASSING OF POPULAR FIGURE

LATE MR. PATRICK BOYCE

Mr. Patrick Boyce, whose death
took place recently at Patricks-
well, was for many years closely
associated with the public and soc-
ial activities of Ballyagran and
Castletown districts (writes our
Ballyagran correspondent). One
of the pioneers in the move for
proper care and maintenance of
graveyards in Co. Limerick, he was
mainly responsible for the big
scheme of improvements carried
out in Castletown cemetery some
ten years ago, and was Chairman
of a local Cemetery Committee,
formed for that purpose. To-day
his remains rest within the walls
of that cemetery, where he spent
so much time and energy in mak-
ing it a place worthy of our dead—
the concrete paths, bordered with
ornamental shrubs and flowers,
standing as a fitting monument to
his memory.

An ardent and enthusiastic Gael,
he took a keen interest in the
building up of Castletown Hurling
Club, and proved a sound adminis-
trator as Chairman of that body
also. On his departure to Patricks-
well his services as trainer of that
team there were eagerly availed of,
and produced excellent results in a
comparatively short space of time.

He was a popular and familiar
figure on many concert platforms
in West Limerick over a quarter of
a century back, being a fine expo-
nent of Irish step-dancing. Later,
he won some coveted awards in far
away Australia, at concerts and
open-air functions organised by
Irish exiles there. His passing at
an early age is deeply regretted
by his very many friends.
