DUBLIN STRIKE

LATEST DEVELOPMENTS

The Irish Transport and General Workers Union of Ireland have notified the Film Renter and Distributing Organisation of Ireland of the termination of an agreement relating to the handling of films.

The notice will take effect in 21 days, and it may result in the distribution of films to provincial cinemas being stopped unless other arrangements are made. This is one of the latest developments following the rejection by the C.I.E. Road Freights Department Workers of the Labour Court's findings on their six weeks old strike.

The Union will convene a meeting of the railway workers to-night to consider the position.

To-day the Strike Committee met to discuss the new situation and are in course of preparing plans for the extension of the strike should the Union's headquarters approve their request.

DEATH OF MR. RALPH HOLLIDAY

The death occurred yesterday at his residence, "Woodlands," Corbally, Limerick, of **Mr. Ralph Holliday**, second son of the late **Mr. Wm. Holliday, J.P.**

The deceased, who had passed middle life, was a director of Messrs. J. and G. Boyd, Ltd., and of Irish Wire Products, Ltd. He was also, until failing health compelled him to live a more or less inactive life, a prominent member of the Limerick Chamber of Commerce. Some years ago he was a keen horseman and a follower of the County Hounds. He is survived by his widow, son and daughter.

The funeral, which takes place to-morrow at St. Mary's Cathedral, will be strictly private.

VOTE OF SYMPATHY.

To-day, at the meeting of the Harbour Board, the Chairman (**Mr. M. W. McGuire, B.C.**) referred to the death of **Mr. Holliday**, and said that his death was deeply regretted. The late **Mr. Holliday**, like his brother, **Mr. E. Holliday**, was a former member of the Harbour Board, and in that capacity he gave many proofs of his ability and of the interest he took in the welfare of the city. He proposed that the sympathy of the Board be tendered to **Mrs. Holliday** and family.

The vote was seconded unanimously and passed in silence.

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
